that feed on birds."

The dry weather, combined with the low number of bird-biting mosquitoes, indicate that aerial spraying is not warranted at this

"We will continue our monitoring program with the state health department. If conditions change, we could possibly consider spraying at some point in the future," said

People can reduce their chances of being exposed to EEE and other viruses carried by mosquitoes by using insect repellents, wearing protective clothing, and by reducing the mosquito population around their homes.

To help reduce the risk of mosquito bites, Smith advises people to:

Wear shoes, long pants with bottoms tucked into boots or socks, and a longsleeved shirt when outdoors for long periods of time, or when many mosquitoes are most active (between dusk and dawn).

Use mosquito repellent according to label directions when outdoors for long periods of time and when mosquitoes are most

Empty pails, swimming pool covers, flower pots and other containers of standing water around the home and yard.

Remove all discarded tires from around your property.

Replace or repair broken screens. Insect repellents that contain DEET are effective but should be used with caution.

"DEET comes in many different concentrations, with percentages ranging from as low as five percent to as high as 100 percent," said Smith. "Make sure to read the label for safety instructions and always follow the directions on the package."
